Meet the Cippi of Malta

These are *cippi* (pronounced "sipi") from Malta! *Cippi* are types of pillars. Each pillar has a different type of writing carved into its base, here we see Phoenician and ancient Greek.

The Phoenicians were a people who lived in modern-day Lebanon more than two thousand years ago. They were skilled shipbuilders, navigators, and sea-traders who spread their alphabet to different parts of the Mediterranean while on trade voyages.

The Phoenician alphabet was made up of twentytwo consonant letters, and was written from right to left.

The ancient Greeks used the Phoenician alphabet to create their own writing. Later, the Romans did the same to create the Latin alphabet, which most people who speak English or French use today.

Fun Fact

Three hundred years ago, the Greek writing on these pillars was used to translate the Phoenician alphabet.

It is thanks to the *cippi* of Malta that we can read Phoenician writing!

Can you think of any other language that is written from right to left?

Hint: It is the official language of the UAE.
